Title of policy / decision to be screened:-

2017 Review of Bathing Waters in Northern Ireland.

Brief description of policy / decision to be screened:-

This review reflects a continuation of existing policy, which is to undertake six-yearly reviews of bathing waters in Northern Ireland.

There would be a financial cost of £15,000-£20,000 per annum to monitor water quality at the three candidate sites of Cloughey, Kilclief and Ballyhornan; some minimal costs associated with a review of any discharge consents at those locations and with assessing compliance; and some minimal costs for the bathing water operators, who would be required to provide signage. There could also be financial implications for Northern Ireland Water (NIW) should it have to provide improved waste water treatment in the vicinity of these locations. Any such costs would be identified in the course of discussions with NIW.

Identification of the candidate sites as bathing waters would be achieved through amending Schedule 1 to The Quality of Bathing Waters Regulations (NI) 2008, so that they are added to the list of bathing waters in Northern Ireland.

Aims and objectives of the policy / decision to be screened:-

The policy objective is to preserve, protect and improve the quality of the environment and to protect public health.

On whom will the policy / decision impact? Consider the internal and external impacts (both actual or potential) staff - there would be additional monitoring, public information and management requirements should the candidate sites be identified; also, staff would have to review discharge consents and assess compliance. service users – there would be a positive impact insofar as the water quality would be monitored regularly and assessed annually; information would be made available to the public; and measures would be taken should there be any pollution incidents. rural community - each of the candidate sites under consideration has a rural setting. Identification as bathing waters should raise their profiles and have a positive impact on the local economy. other public sector organizations – the candidate sites have been nominated by local authorities. Identification as bathing waters should contribute positively to their respective tourism strategies. There would be some additional costs associated with management of the sites and the provision of signage. voluntary / community groups / trade unions – lobby groups and community associations have campaigned for the identification of these candidate sites as
