This table is intended to provide valuations for slow-growing strains of corn-fed free range table birds. It is NOT intended to be used for growers with their own processing facilities, producing birds for direct sales.

Slow-growing strains are likely to be predominantly white-feathered, although some may have a proportion of brown feathers. The valuations are based on the use of non-organic diets with corn and assume that birds are reared 'as-hatched' i.e. males and females reared together in broadly equal numbers.

Although designated as 'free-range', birds may be contained within the building up to 28 days of age under the terms of the marketing regulations. In addition, the birds may be subject to forced confinement within the poultry house in the event of earlier instructions from the Government. The presence of 'pop-holes' on the sides of the building, together with evidence of pasture wear around the building are indicators that the flock is free range.
