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## 1. INTRODUCTION

## **Background**

This is an annual snapshot that provides analysis of Section 75 survey returns for the Northern Ireland Rural Development Programme (NIRDP) applications at both programme level and scheme level.

## Methodology

The programme level analysis is based on the total number of Section 75 forms issued up to the end of July 2021 for all the programme schemes with the exceptions of the Environmental Farming Scheme and the Areas of Natural Constraint Scheme. For these schemes, all beneficiaries are asked to complete the survey annually when they re-apply for funding. Therefore, analysis is only provided on survey forms returned in the most recent year of the scheme.

Different survey response rates are achieved for each scheme. The overall programme analysis figures are calculated by weighting each scheme's survey returns based on the number of applications they received (N.B. in the case of EFS and ANC this means annual payment applications). For analysis purposes, this means the Section 75 results are representative of all 50,746 programme applications.

The analysis provided at scheme level is based on the actual number of returns where the survey question have been answered by the respondents. For example, where 500 surveys have been returned for a scheme but only 490 have answered a particular question, the breakdown for each category will be calculated based on the 490 responses. Where appropriate, a breakdown will be provided by successful applicants. For the purpose of this report, successful applicants are those who have completed their project or have accepted their letter of offer.

Annex B provides the source and links to the comparative context indicators used in analysis. These indicators provide context for scheme performance for each Section 75 category at the farming, rural and Northern Ireland population levels. For each scheme the most relevant population comparator or comparators are lightly shaded in the snapshot table.

Annex C provides a full list of questions and Section 75 categories. For the purposes of reporting a number of the categories are excluded from the report to avoid individual statistical disclosure for categories with a low number of responses.

## **Next Updates**

Finalised data for 2022 is scheduled for reporting in September 2022.

In total, 50,137 Section 75 survey forms have been issued to NIRDP 2014-2020 scheme applicants<sup>1</sup>. 17,697 have been completed or partially completed, giving a total programme response rate of 35 per cent.

Weighting is applied to each scheme based on their proportion of the total programme applications. For analysis purposes, this means the Section 75 results are representative of all 50,764<sup>2</sup> applicants who have applied to the programme.

#### Gender



15 per cent of the applicants are female. This is low in comparison to 50 per cent of the rural population reported as female and 24 per cent of the farm labour force.

# Disability



6 per cent of the RDP applicants are disabled, which is low compared to 26 per cent of the rural population and 30 per cent of farmers.

## **Racial Group**



Almost 100 per cent of the RDP applicants are white, which compares with 99 per cent of the rural population in the Census.

## **Sexual Orientation**



Almost 99 per cent of the RDP applicants are recorded as heterosexual. This figure is slightly higher than 94 per cent of the population recorded as heterosexual in the Northern Ireland Life and Times survey.

## Religion



43 per cent of RDP applicants are from the Catholic community, which is slightly low, compared to a rural population figure of 47 per cent but in line with a farming context figure of 42 per cent.

## Age



31 per cent of the applicants are aged between 16 and 40 years old which is low compared to 42 per cent of the rural population but high compared with 8 per cent of Northern Ireland farmers. 4 per cent of applicants are aged 16-24 years old, which is slightly over-representative of the farming community but under-representative of the rural population. 14 per cent of applicants are aged 65 and over, which is under-representative of both farmers and the rural population. At 36 per cent, the 25-44 age group is over-representative of farmers for applications but representative of the rural population. Applications from the 45-64 age group are representative of the farming population but over-representative of the rural population.



There was 5,206 online applications made for Tranches 1-5<sup>3</sup> of BDGs and 4,392 of the applicants completed or partially completed a Section 75 survey as part of the process. This gives a response rate of 84 per cent. All applicants are required to be farm managers and are successfully accepted into the scheme if they meet this criterion.

#### Gender



5 per cent of the beneficiaries are female. This is comparable with the results of the farm structure survey, which indicates that around 4 per cent of farmers are female.

## **Disability**



3 per cent of the beneficiaries are disabled which is low compared to the farming context figure of 30 per cent.

## **Racial Group**



100 per cent of the beneficiaries are white which compares with 99 per cent of the rural population in the Census.

### **Sexual Orientation**



Just over 99 per cent of the BDG beneficiaries are recorded as heterosexual. This figure is slightly higher than 94 per cent of the population recorded as heterosexual in the Northern Ireland Life and Times Survey.

## Religion



60 per cent of the beneficiaries are from the Protestant community. This is high compared to a farming context figure of 51 per cent.

## Age



44 per cent are aged between 16 and 40 and 53 per cent are aged 16-44. These figures are high compared with the farming context figure of 8 per cent aged 16-40 and 19 per cent aged 16-44.

In total, 18,032 people have attended Farm Family Key Skills training to date with 1,325 Section 75 forms completed and returned by post or online giving a response rate of 7 per cent. The scheme is open to farmers, their families and the farm labour force.

#### Gender



25 per cent of the beneficiaries are female. This is comparable with the results of the Farm Structure Survey, which suggests that around 24 per cent of the farm labour force are female but low compared to the rural population figure of 50%.



## **Disability**

8 per cent of the beneficiaries are disabled which is low compared to 26 per cent of the rural population reported as disabled.



## **Racial Group**

99 per cent of the beneficiaries are white which compares with 99 per cent of the rural population in the Census.



## **Sexual Orientation**

98 per cent of the beneficiaries are heterosexual. This figure compares with 94 per cent of the population recorded as heterosexual in the Northern Ireland Life and Times survey.



#### Religion

35 per cent of the beneficiaries are from the Catholic community. This is much lower than the rural context figure of 47 per cent and low compared to the farming context figure of 42 per cent.





25 per cent of the beneficiaries are aged 16-40. This is low, compared to 42 per cent of the rural population aged 16-40, but high compared to 8 per cent of farmers in this age bracket. 53 per cent of training participants are in the 45-64 age group; this rate is over-representative of both the rural and farming populations.

42 per cent of the beneficiaries are age 16-40, which is much higher than the farming context figure of 8 per cent for this age group. Over half the beneficiaries are aged 16-44, which again is much higher than the farming context figure of 19 per cent.

In total there are 520 people have applied for Farm Innovation Visits to date with 155 Section 75 forms completed and returned by post or online giving a response rate of 30 per cent. The scheme is open to applications from farmers and the farm labour force.

## Gender



4 per cent of the beneficiaries are female. This is comparable to the results of the farm structure survey which indicates that around 4 per cent of farmers are female but low compared to the farm labour force figure of 24 per cent.

34 per cent of the applicants are from the Catholic community. This is much lower than the rural context figure of 47 per cent and lower than the farming context figure of 42 per cent.

#### Age



47 per cent of the applicants are aged 16-40. This is age group is comparable to 42 per cent of the rural population aged 16-40 but high compared to the farming context figure of 8 per cent. 6 per cent of beneficiaries are aged 65 and over which is underrepresentative of both the farming and rural populations.

For Tier 1 Tranche 1 there were 3,550 valid applications from farmers and 3,152 completed or partially completed S75 forms.

For **Tier 1 Tranche 2** there were 2,996 valid applications from farmers and 2,458 completed or partially completed S75 forms.

For Tier 1 Tranche 3 there were 4,067 valid applications from farmers and 3,084 completed or partially completed S75 forms.

For Tier 2 Tranche 1 there were 188 valid applications from farmers and 185 completed or partially completed S75 forms.



The overall response rate for FBIS is 82 per cent with the highest response rate for Tier 2 Tranche 1. Tier 1 response rates decreased with each tranche. To apply for FBIS you were required to be a farmer with a valid Farm Business ID. A scoring panel selected successful candidates.

## Gender



Across both Tiers and Tranches, around 5 per cent of S75 responses were female. These figures are comparable with the Farm Structure Survey which suggests around 4 per cent of farmers are female.

## **Disability**



When compared to disability reported in the farming community (30 per cent), figures across all Tiers and Tranches for FBIS are low. There is little variation between Tiers and Tranches and figures for disability among applicants is around 2 per cent.

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## **Racial Group**

99 per cent of the rural population in the Census are white which compares with the breakdown for all the BIS Tiers and Tranches.



#### **Sexual Orientation**

94 per cent of the population recorded as heterosexual in the Northern Ireland Life and Times survey. Applicants across BIS Tiers and Tranches are slightly higher in comparison at over 98 per cent.

## Religion



In the farming context, 51 per cent are from a Protestant background. Based on survey responses, applications for both Tiers and Tranches are over-representative of Protestant farmers with figures ranging from 57 per cent to 63 per cent Protestant. There is a small but consistent increase in the success rate of Protestant applicants compared to total applicants.

## Age



The rate for young farmer applicants (16-40) is around 48 per cent for Tier 1 and 62 per cent for Tier 2, which is much higher than 8 per cent figure in the DAERA equality indicator report. There is a consistent increase in the success rate of the 16-40 age group for all Tranches of Tier 1, which is consistent with the scoring system.

In total, there are 365 people who have applied for Forestry schemes to date with 137 Section 75 forms completed and returned by post giving a response rate of 38 per cent.

#### Gender



10 per cent of the beneficiaries are female. This is high compared to the results of the farm structure survey, which indicates that around 4 per cent of farmers are female.



## **Disability**

11 per cent of the applicants are disabled which is low compared to 30 per cent of the farming community reported as disabled.



## **Racial Group**

99 per cent of the applicants are white compared with 99 per cent of the rural population in the Census.



#### **Sexual Orientation**

99 per cent of the applicants are heterosexual compared with 94 per cent of the rural population in the NI Life and Times Survey.



## Religion

52 per cent of the applicants are from the Protestant community. This is comparable to the farming context figure of 51 per cent.
